Discuss Sermon

The Bible is full of different lessons and principles that seem to be a paradox to the average person living in our culture. One example is discovered in Matthew 19:13-30 as we observe Jesus introduce "The Principle of Paradox Living." There are three foundational principles that are taught by Jesus as to how we can live a life of success in the eyes of the Lord. The world defines success much differently than the Lord. Some define success as a rise to power others define it as amassing great wealth but the Lord defines it as a life that glorifies Him with three foundational elements: (1) Humility, (2) Sacrifice, and (3) Surrender. Jesus sums up this type of a life with one simple paradoxical statement:

But many who are first will be last, and the last first.

- Why does this teaching of Jesus seem to be a paradoxical principle today?
- What does it mean for the first to be last and the last to be first?

Exchange Views

Dr. J. B. Hawthorne was a noted orator sought by scores of churches and tens of thousands of hearers. Once he went to help a southern church in a two-week evangelistic campaign. The end of the meetings found only a little, unpromising lad saved. Dr. Hawthorne was a bit chagrined. But that boy became the noted A. T. Robertson, the greatest American Greek scholar of the 20th century.

Jesus Christ helps us understand that the life of success is discovered when we learn to focus more on Him and less on ourselves. D.L. Moody often observed that you could tell the state of a man's spiritual maturity by how much he talked about himself versus how much he talked about the Lord our God.

- What does this principle mean: "Your Sacrifice is Not Unseen: God rewards your Resolve"?
